

Care Tips for Pothos (Epipremnum)

These tips are considered basic care tips for all of the species and hybrids in this genus. Individual notes on favorite species can be found on the reverse.

- Light: Although the best exposure can vary between different hybrids, most Pothos appreciate medium to bright, indirect light. They can adapt to low-light conditions as well as direct sunlight, but medium/indirect is best.
- **Soil:** Any potting soil that drains well. Pothos are not picky as long as they're not in standing water.
- Water: Pothos are not picky about water; keep soil evenly moist but well drained.
- **Drainage:** In potting soil, Pothos need good drainage so their containers are never bogged down with water. They will, however, root and grow directly in water without any soil, and have been known to grow like this for many years indoors.
- **Feeding:** Again, these easy-care plants are not picky. Monthly, with a liquid seaweed-based fertilizer such as Hasta-Gro is excellent.
- Other tips for success: Be prepared for your Pothos to sprawl, as they naturally form long, vining stems that will produce aerial roots to attach to nearby surfaces. Wall clips can be used to create a vertical habit, or they're quite happy in hanging baskets or trained up a moss totem. Pothos are considered an excellent houseplant for inexperienced gardeners, and they are good for improving indoor air quality.



Care Tips for Pothos (Epipremnum)

'Golden' Pothos– has similar coloring and form to 'Jade' Pothos with the added ornamental value of golden-flecked variegation. Just as easy and durable .



'Neon' Pothos – Brightly colored, chartreuse-green foliage is ideal for brightening up indoor spaces! This variety is just as easy and durable as 'Jade' and 'Golden.' Makes a beautiful addition to a mixed houseplant container to highlight the foliage of other plants nearby.



'Marble Queen' Pothos– a highly variegated variety with heart-shaped leaves and creamy-white variation.



'Pearls and Jade' Pothos– a sport of the variety 'Marble Queen' and features smaller white-edged, gray-green leaves streaked with cream, white, and gray. It's smaller and slower-growing than other pothos varieties.



'N'Joy' Pothos – this more linear-shaped species is often confused with other narrow-leaf species such as *H. linearis* and *H. kentiana*. All are easy to care for and worthy of any collection.



'Snow Queen' Pothos- a variegated version with more white than green. It is so easy, perfect for beginners, as pothos is one of the easiest plants to grow.
